

## Our Einzig Family

My name is Boog Graham. I married Janelle Aileen Taylor, and we live in Franklin Township within in the Northern York County region of Pennsylvania. Janelle's younger sister is Susan Lynn Taylor who married Steven Ray Waller, and they live in Conestoga Lancaster County Pennsylvania.

Janelle's and Sue's parents were Kenneth James Henry Taylor and Jane Alice Hines.<sup>1</sup> Ken and Jane met while living in the city of York, York County Pennsylvania. Ken's parents were Austin James Taylor<sup>2</sup> and Bessie Mae Einsig.<sup>1</sup>

Bessie Einsig was born in 1892 to John Henry Einsig (1860-1939)<sup>3</sup> and Mary Ann Schleich.<sup>ii</sup> Both the Einsig and Taylor families lived in the same neighborhood of Sherman Street in York Pennsylvania. This area was once a small village of Freystown<sup>4</sup> in Spring Garden Township York County.

John H. Einsig was the son of David Jacob Einzig (1829-1908).<sup>5</sup> David was born March 15<sup>th</sup> 1829 to David Einzig (b.1807)<sup>6</sup> and Barbara Rupp<sup>7</sup> in the Schwarzwald Kreis<sup>iii</sup> of Württemberg<sup>iv</sup> Germany.<sup>8</sup>

We are not certain what became of David Einzig, but his wife Barbara, and five Einzig children emigrated from Ruesten<sup>v</sup> through the ports in Bremen Germany on a ship known as a Barque.<sup>vi</sup> The ship's name was called, Republic, which arrived at the ports of Baltimore on December 22<sup>nd</sup> 1843. Their destination was identified as Pennsylvania.<sup>9</sup> The name of Barbara Rupp, who was 34 years old, born about 1809, was listed with five Einzig children.

- i. David Einsig was 13 years old, and was born about 1830.
- ii. Johannes (John) Einsig was 12 years old, and was born about 1831.<sup>vii</sup>
- iii. Maria (Isabelle) Einsig was 8 years old, and was born about 1835.
- iv. Albert Einsig was 2 years old and was born about 1841.
- v. Mathias (Matthew) Einsig was 1 ½ years old and was born about April 1842.

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<sup>i</sup> Einzig-Einsig: other possible spellings; Hanzig, Einziege, Enzig, Henzig, Heinziges, Henzag, and Inzigs.

<sup>ii</sup> Mary was also known as Annie Mary, and her last name has been spelled as, Schleigh and Schlich.

<sup>iii</sup> Schwarzwald means Black Forest and Kreis means District, today it is known as Schwarzwald-Baar-Kreis.

<sup>iv</sup> Württemberg Germany existed from 1806 to 1918, and is now known as the state of Baden-Württemberg.

<sup>v</sup> The word, Ruesten may be a miss spelling of Reusten, which is next to present day Reusten Rathaus located in the Tübingen region of Baden-Württemberg Germany, which is within the 19<sup>th</sup> century administrative district and parish of Schwarzwald Kreis (Black Forest District) of Germany.

<sup>vi</sup> The ship record indicated the ship as a Bark, however the correct spelling is Barque. This type of ship comprises of three (or more) masts, fore-and-aft sails on the aftermost mast and square sails on all other masts. Barques were the workhorse of the Golden Age of Sail in the mid-19th century as they attained passages that nearly matched full rigged ships but could operate with smaller crews.

<sup>vii</sup> My wife Janelle is a 3<sup>rd</sup> cousin, once removed, to my nephew, Ezekiel Einsig-Graham. Ezekiel's ggg-grandparents were John Einzig (1831-1915) and his wife Theresa (Rose) Findling. Janelle's gg-grandfather, David, is the brother of Ezekiel's ggg-grandfather, John; both brothers emigrated in 1843 from Germany.

In the August 9<sup>th</sup> 1850 federal census record for York County Pennsylvania, David Einzig and his new wife Hanna (Christiana) Ross, and John Enzig with his sister Isabel lived together. They lived next door to their uncle Anton Einsig,<sup>10</sup> his wife Leonorah (Eleanor), and their children in the Freystown area of Spring Garden Township York County Pennsylvania.

### Einzig Families in America

The name Einzig is a very unique name, and was often spelled in different English variations; Einzig, Ensig, Einsick, and Einsic.

Many family members typically travelled around the counties of Central Pennsylvania and Northern Maryland. They also lived near other family members, or together in one home, or next door to each other, or on the same streets, or with other family members. All of these variables made it very difficult to identify which member belonged to what parents. We did our best to identify the families that settled in Albany County New York, and York, Schuylkill, Berks, and Lehigh Counties in Pennsylvania.

All of the 19<sup>th</sup> century Einzig patriarchs, their sons, and their daughter's husbands were independent peddlers. Often in their own business as basket makers, junk dealers, rag peddlers, horse dealers, brush makers, or laborers in odd jobs; belonging to a group of peddlers who often had colorful wagons used to sale their goods, while leaving their home for long periods of time.<sup>viii</sup>

As the early 20<sup>th</sup> century approached, the 3<sup>rd</sup> generation of Einzig families continued their family trades, but many members also began to branch out into the industrial and semi professional trades.

At this point in our research, with the exception of Frank Einsick (1832-1909), all of the other Einzig families are related to the late 18<sup>th</sup> century German parents of Antonii Einzig and Joanna Pfaus family.

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<sup>viii</sup> The Einsig family may have been considered Gypsies in their home country of Germany, and the term may have carried over to their home in York area.

## Einzig German Lineage

The German *Einzig*<sup>ix</sup> family lived in the Black Forest region of Württemberg Germany. Family members from two brothers, Elias and Johann George Einsig, emigrated from the Black Forest region of German to York County Pennsylvania and Albany County in New York. From York County members moved into Lehigh County Pennsylvania.

Family members from Elias and Johann George are the 1<sup>st</sup> know *Einzig* members who immigrated prior to 1843, and settled in Albany County New York and York County Pennsylvania. Then at some point around 1852, Johann George, and a few of his children came to America, and settled in around Albany County New York, and Johann's son Martin's children, Fidel and Martin, settled in Lehigh County Pennsylvania.

The family often used the same names in naming their children; Catherine or Kate or Katie, David, George, Rose, John, Ellen, Elizabeth, and Teresa. We also believe that some of the children were cared for by other *Einsig* family members. Potentially causing errors in identifying whose child belongs to whose parents. There are also the family oral histories and accounts, that don't match the federal, county, and local civil and court records. Not to mention some of those records probably had errors too, particularly the death records.

We also looked at German records, keeping in mind the common use of German naming traditions; Baptism had a saint's name, secular name, and last name.

- If two given names were given to the child, the first given name was typically a spiritual or saint's name. The second given name was the secular or call name, which is the name the person would be known by; both within the family and to the rest of the world. Thus the boys would be Johan Adam, Johan George, etc., or Philip Peter, Philip Jacob, etc. Girls would be named Anna Barbara, Anna Margaret, etc., or Maria Elizabeth, Maria Catherine, etc. But after baptism, these people would not be known as John, Philip, Anna, or Maria, respectively. They would instead be known by what we would think of now as their middle name, which was their secular name.

Antonii *Einzig* and Joanna Pfaus had two known children.<sup>11</sup>

- i. Elias *Einsig* (b.1767)
- ii. Georgium (Johann George) *Einzig* (b. about 1775)<sup>12</sup>

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<sup>ix</sup> Other spellings of *Einzig* included *Eissig*, *Eissich*, and *Eisig*.

## Elias Einzig (b.1767)

Elias Einzig was born, and christened, on January 1<sup>st</sup> 1767 to Antonii Einzig and Joanna Pfau in Rotenfels,<sup>x</sup> Baden,<sup>xi</sup> Germany.<sup>13</sup>

Elias married Agnes Wiesenfad,<sup>xii</sup> and they had three sons

- i. Joanes Baptista Einzig was born to Elias Einzig and Agnes Wiesenfad. Jonas was christened February 13<sup>th</sup> 1801 as a Katholisch<sup>xiii</sup> in the village of Bierlingen,<sup>xiv</sup> located in the Schwarzwald Kreis<sup>xv</sup> of Württemberg<sup>xvi</sup> Germany.<sup>14</sup>
- ii. Antonius Einzig was born to Elias Einzig and Agnes Wiesenfad. Antonius was christened February 26<sup>th</sup> 1804 as a Katholisch in the village of Ahldorf,<sup>xvii</sup> located in the Schwarzwald Kreis of Württemberg Germany.<sup>15</sup> See Anton Einzig (1804-1858).<sup>16</sup>
- iii. David Mathias Einzig was born to Elias Einzig and Agnes Wiesenfad. David was christened February 17<sup>th</sup> 1807 as a Katholisch in the village of Hailfingen, located in the Schwarzwald Kreis of Württemberg Germany.<sup>17</sup> See David Einzig (b.1807)<sup>18</sup>

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<sup>x</sup> Rotenfels is known today as Bad Rotenfels, which is a neighborhood (district) in the city of Gaggenau. Gaggenau is within the district of Rastatt, Baden-Württemberg Germany. Rotenfels is located some 8 km northeast of Baden-Baden.

<sup>xi</sup> Baden was the historical state of Germany, and the former Prussian Hohenzollern, and Württemberg, part of the region of Swabia.

<sup>xii</sup> Another spelling for Wiesenfad is Wisafautin.

<sup>xiii</sup> Katholisch is not a region, district, or town, and in English Katholisch means Catholic.

<sup>xiv</sup> Bierlingen is about 7 miles West of Ahldorf, and 10 miles South Hailfingen. Bierlingen is a village or small town situated in present day Freudenstadt district, within the Black Forest region of Baden-Württemberg Germany.

<sup>xv</sup> Schwarzwald means Black Forest and Kreis means District, today it is known as Schwarzwald-Baar-Kreis Germany

<sup>xvi</sup> Württemberg was a state in Germany, 1806 to 1918, located in the area that is now Baden-Württemberg.

<sup>xvii</sup> Ahldorf is a village or small town situated in present day Freudenstadt district, within the Black Forest region of Baden-Württemberg Germany.
